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#### PURPOSE OF THE ANNUAL PERFORMANCE REPORT

The National Quality Framework (NQF) is Australia's commitment to high quality children's education and care. It aims to ensure the health, safety and wellbeing of children attending NQF approved services, as well as promote their educational and developmental outcomes.

This report analyses fundamental aspects of the NQF, including children's health and safety, educational program and practice, workforce trends, and families' understanding of quality.

ACECQA's role is guided by a shared <u>NQF Evaluation Framework</u>. In addition to this annual report, we publish quarterly <u>NQF Snapshots</u>, <u>occasional papers</u> and discrete research projects.

Most of the data used in this report is sourced from the **National Quality Agenda IT System (NQA ITS)**, as at 30 June 2023.






## **OVERVIEW OF THE SECTOR: PROVIDERS**

#### As at 30 June 2023:

- There were around 7200 service providers, with 79% operating a single service.
- The 15 largest providers in Australia operate more than 100 services each, with a combined total of around 3700 services.
- **Private for-profit providers** operate:
  - 69% of long day care services
  - 63% of family day care services
  - 52% of outside school hours care services
  - 1% of preschools/kindergartens.
- 'Private not-for-profit community managed' providers operate half of preschools/kindergartens, with more than a fifth (21%) being 'state/territory and local government managed'.




#### **OVERVIEW OF THE SECTOR: SERVICES**

#### As at 30 June 2023:

- Over 17,300 children's education and care services approved to operate under the NOF:
  - 51% classified as long day care services
  - 29% outside school hours care services
  - 18% preschools/kindergartens
  - 3% family day care services.<sup>1</sup>
- Four-fifths (80%) of services located in the three most populous states: New South Wales (34%), Victoria (27%) and Queensland (19%).
- More than 15,700 services had a published quality rating<sup>2</sup> against the National Quality Standard (NQS), with 89% of these services rated Meeting NQS or above.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> The proportion of services with a quality rating will not reach 100% at any one time because a proportion of services will only recently have been approved and may not have started operating or may have only been operating for a short period of time. In general, state and territory regulatory authorities will not assess and rate newly approved services which have been operating for less than 9-12.



<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup>Centre-based services offering more than one type of service are classified as follows: services which provide long day care in addition to any other service type are classified as long day care services; services which provide preschool/kindergarten as well as outside school hours care are classified as preschools/kindergartens; services which provide outside school hours care only are classified as outside school hours care services.


## **CHILDREN'S HEALTH AND SAFETY**

**Quality Area 2** of the NQS has two standards that address health and safety.

#### As at **30 June 2023**:

• 93% of services are rated Meeting NQS or above, up from 92% one year ago and 91% two years ago.

Figure 1: Proportion of services rated Meeting NQS or above for children's health and safety






### **Educational program and practice**

**Quality Area 1** of the NQS has three standards that address educational program and practice.

#### As at **30 June 2023**:

- 98% of preschools/kindergartens are rated Meeting NQS or above, followed by 92% of long day care services and 91% of outside school hours care services.
- Almost three-quarters (72%) of family day care services are rated Meeting NQS or above – the highest proportion to date.




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#### Children from vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds

- Children from more disadvantaged backgrounds are more likely to be developmentally vulnerable and receive the greatest benefits from attending high quality education and care services.
- As at 30 June 2023, 86% of services in the most disadvantaged areas are rated Meeting NQS or above, compared with 92% in the most advantaged areas. This gap has endured over the last seven years.
- Differences in the distribution of quality ratings are most pronounced at the high end, with 21% of services in Australia's most disadvantaged areas rated Exceeding NQS or above, compared with 29% in the most advantaged areas.

Figure 3: Comparison of overall quality ratings between the most disadvantaged and most advantaged areas






Chapter 4

Workforce

#### Workforce

- Quality outcomes for children depend upon a highly skilled, well supported and professionally recognised workforce.
- As at 30 June 2023, 17.0% of long day care services hold a staffing waiver, compared with 2.4% of preschools/kindergartens and 2.2% of outside school hours care services.
- The recent high proportions follow the introduction of new staffing requirements on 1 January 2020 and the ongoing impact of COVID-19, as well as persistent workforce challenges, particularly in relation to the supply of, and demand for, early childhood teachers.

#### Families' understanding of quality

- The NQF aims to improve public knowledge and access to information about the quality of children's education and care services.
- The quality rating of the service continues to be ranked as the least important relative to other decisionmaking factors.
- Based on ACECQA's biennial families' survey, skilled educators, cost and accessibility are the most important decision-making factors for families when choosing a children's education and care service.
